




We don't show images like this.



But this was what visitors saw and residents lived with before the adoption of Architectural Review.






Today, all of our Town Center Master Plans and Zoning Ordinances identify appearance as a central objective – with strong public support.

Dunkirk – "distinctive identity" "Gateway to Calvert County" "unified attractive aspect"



Huntingtown - "preserve small town character: "ensure that signs enhance, not detract, from the town's appearance"

Lusby, Owings, St. Leonard – "The overall appearance of a community bears a direct relationship to the social well-being of its residents and to property values."



Prince Frederick – "establish standards for signs that will minimize clutter and promote an attractive appearance along roadways"

Solomons – "Support and enhance a mix of uses in the Solomons Island Village Core that are family-friendly, encourage year round activity, and are visually compatible with Solomons architectural heritage that makes it a distinctive destination."

One of the Visions of the Comprehensive Plan states:

"Our Town Centers are attractive, convenient, and interesting places to live, work and shop."

An Action Item states:

"As Master Plans are revised, look for ways to preserve and enhance the <u>unique character</u> of each town center."

What else does the Comprehensive Plan say about the Town Centers?

<u>Prince Frederick</u>: "Prince Frederick is the seat of County government and is the logical location for governmental, educational and legal services."





Solomons: "Solomon's unique geography, location on the water, and historic atmosphere makes it well suited as a recreation destination."

What else does the Comprehensive Plan say about the Town Centers?

<u>Dunkirk</u>: "Dunkirk has the potential to be one of the County's major employment centers due to its proximity to Washington, D.C. and the area's airports, interstate highways, and metropolitan centers. Dunkirk currently serves as a retail and services center and significant commercial growth in this area is anticipated."





<u>Lusby</u>: "Lusby is emerging as a place for high-technology development."

Other Town Centers: "Minor town centers are to serve as local convenience centers unless individual town center master plans determine otherwise."



Slowly, we've been making progress with the use of Architectural Review criteria <u>unique</u> to each Town Center.








Before

Why would we greet visitors with signs like this when even corporate chains are perfectly willing to comply with local regulations?







We're seeing freestanding signs that are a bit more compatible with their buildings. Like this....





If we stay on course and maintain our commitment to making all of our Town Centers worthy of our beautiful natural, cultural and historical resources, we will enhance our economy while enjoying this wonderful County.



But the proposed sign regulations can change all that, moving us backward, not forward.

... not only in our Town Centers, but County-wide.

Prince Frederick Zoning Ordinance

Building Sign Design

- Every building sign shall be designed as an integal architectural element of the building.
- Signs on burnings shall not obstruct architectural features of the building. Signs shall not be mounted a roofs, extend above the roof line or above the second story of the building.
- 3. All signs for buildings within a shopling center, office complex, commercial park business center shall be uniform in design. Uniformity is defined as
- a) having the same (or similar) dimension or proportions
- b) having the same (or comprementary) background colors (where an incable)
- c) being of the same merial.
- 4. The number of graphic elements (i.e., words and/o symbols) on a sign shall be held to the minimum needed to convey the sign's ajor message. A rule of thumb is to limit the number of syllables and symbols

M. Freestanding Sign Design

- Every freestanding sign shall be compatible with the building(s) which it relates in terms of style, color, proportion and scale.
- 2. All individual signs on a freestanding base shall be uniform in design. Uniformity in affined as
- a) having the same (or similar) dimensions or proportions
- b) having the same (or complimentary) background colors (where applicable)
- being of the same material.
- Read boards shall be limited to two lines and styll have the same background color and with dimensions as the primary sign.



Example uniform sign design within a shopping center.

Almost all current design standards will be gone in <u>all</u> Town Centers.

I. Every building sign shall be designed as an interval architectural element of the building.

1. Every freestanding sign shall be compatible with the building(s) which it relates in terms of style, color, proportion and scale.



All Town Centers currently require bases and/or frames for freestanding signs. The proposed regulations will delete this requirement.



We'll see signs like this again.

Sign Types Proposed – Permanent Free-Standing Signs

These are attractive examples, BUT ...

The proposed sign regulations will take us back to signs like this.





Tall pole signs will be back in <u>all</u> Town Centers. In Prince Frederick, the height proposed is 22'.

The Prince Frederick charrette report recommended a maximum height of 10 feet. Current regulations allow a maximum of 14 feet.



This is about what a 22 foot tall sign looks like.

Sign, approximately 20 feet tall

Sally, approximately 5 feet 5 inches

Sign Types Proposed – Permanent Building Signs

Since the proposal is to eliminate design criteria, building signs can go back to being any combination of sizes, styles and lighting.



Sign Types Proposed – Electronic Message Signs & Reader Boards




Electronic Messaging Center (EMC) signs may be permitted in all or most Town Centers and in Industrial Parks.

Sign Types Proposed – "Temporary" Signs

Two temporary signs (air-activated, balloons, banners, blades, etc.) will be permitted on each parcel in all Town Centers <u>and</u> any non-residential use <u>outside</u> the Town Centers. There is <u>no</u> time limit on temporary signs.





Sign Types Proposed – Window Signs

Window Signs

- 1st draft proposed regulations allowed up to 25% of glass area to be covered with signage
- 2nd draft proposed to allow up to 50%
- Public Hearing proposes window signs to be allowed with no restriction on the amount of window area covered by window signs



Why have windows?

Sign Types Proposed – Directional/Off-Premise Signs

In the proposed regulations, no distinction is being made between on-premise and off-premise signs, and no restrictions are proposed for "Litter On A Stick".





Directional Sign Conditions are being relaxed by eliminating the requirement that only businesses catering to the travelling public can have them. Proposed Conditions:

- 1 sign per driveway entrance w/any public road.
- Max sign area 5 sq. ft.
- Max height 3'

Sign Types Proposed – Portable Signs

Portable Signs

Where Permitted: Inside &

Outside Town Centers

Size: 12 sq. ft., maximum width of 3' & maximum height of 4'

Number Permitted: 1 per site

Other restrictions apply.


Sign Types Proposed – Signs on Bus Shelters

Signs on Bus Shelters

- Option A: Prohibit signs on bus shelters*
- Option B: Delete prohibition; allow signs on bus shelters, regulate as a permanent building sign

with a temporary message

Sign Types Proposed – Signs on Bus Shelters

... there's nothing in the proposed regulations to prevent signs like this, and not just on bus shelters, but everywhere ...



FYI - Bus shelters <u>without</u> signs are permitted just about anywhere.

The new sign regulations propose to allow <u>all</u> of the types of signs described in this slideshow (except electronic) that are permitted <u>within</u> the Town Centers to also be permitted <u>OUTSIDE</u> the Town Centers.



There are at least 97 <u>non-residential</u> uses permitted outside the Town Centers that might want to erect larger signs (both permanent and "temporary") without being required to comply with Architectural Review criteria.

Here are just a few of such non-residential uses ...






These are a few more examples of uses permitted outside the Town Centers. They currently display tasteful, unobtrusive signs (or no signs at all), **BUT** ...










... the proposed regulations will allow <u>all</u> of these types of signs <u>OUTSIDE</u> the Town Centers... with <u>NO</u> Architectural Review criteria.






